# **BETTER TOGETHER**

This was the mantra for Bill, Rachel, Courtney, and my summer training through City Forward Collective in collaboration with The New Teacher Project (TNTP). City Forward Collective is a new effort to move Milwaukee forward by eliminating educational inequities and ensuring every child has access to a great school.

The 1<sup>st</sup> thing the team was tasked with was creating three different learning models to align with Center for Disease Control's (CDC) and the Milwaukee Health Department's advice on CoVID19. The three model types were as follows:

- High Spread-Virtual/Remote learning model
- Moderate Spread-Hybrid learning model
- Low Spread- In person model with modifications for safe distancing

This was a challenging way to start a training series as you had to investigate every minutia of a schedule, activity, or plan to ensure the students/teachers and community were safe. Consideration for schedules, spacing, capacities, lunch, meeting academic goals, maintaining culture, ensuring individualized education, assuring interactions with peers, providing technology, aligning staff to schedules/tasks, and social emotional learning opportunities.

The trainings provided opportunities for leadership and instructor collaborations and problem-solving running May 28<sup>th</sup> through August 4<sup>th</sup> and covering the following topics:

Academics and instruction (adapting scope & sequence and accelerating learning), Operations & technology (creating schedules & aligning tech to support), Operations and talent (aligning staff to educational model), Virtual learning, Whole child Supports & School Culture (supporting the whole child), Staff Development through Virtual professional development, and Assessment, Data, and Accountability (progress monitoring).

At TNTP, their vision for authentic engagement rested on four key ideas: shared vision, authentic collaboration, intentional culture & diversity, 360° communication. They enforced that successful efforts "frequently include one or more of the four pillars". In this regard, our first step towards communication and decision making came in the form of a parent/guardian survey. The survey helped guide our decisions, the results shared in multiple formats and informational meetings scheduled.

They also stressed establishing virtual norms for remote learning platforms. The learning environment should be a place to safely share different perspectives, everyone should have equity in voice, all participants use active/attentive listening, have a commitment to the work to be done and mindful when using technology.

We looked at what we did well, what needs to be improved, what part of our academic program is hardest to plan for remotely, how can we support families, how do we improve our communication? All good questions! We did lots of critical thinking and evaluation in order to provide our students with the best possible learning environment.

Through all of this we learned from each other, and know we are ...



THEN & NOW

Over the last 14 years at St. Coletta Day School, I worked first as a paraprofessional for nine years and now as a Teacher for five years. My students are always my number one priority. The 2019-2020 school year was no different. We started the year building relationships, forming expectations, modeling student behavior, exploring new information and learning so many new and wonderful things. Then the 2019-2020 school year was the most different school year that ever existed.

### THEN ....

On Friday March 13th, 2020, it was a typical day at St. Coletta Day School. On March 13th, I found myself doing what I typically do as a teacher. Each day I focus on two things. First, I always work and develop relationships with my students. I do this before I teach them, while I teach them and after I teach them. The second thing happens while I teach them. I collect data and reflect on data that my students produce. I use this data to determine what my students know, what they need retaught and what next steps I can take to educate them. Data drives the scope and sequence that we as teachers take during the school year. This means that as I teach a lesson, if my students understand at least 80% of the concepts then I can teach them the next concepts/scope and follow the pattern or sequence of the curriculum. If they do not understand at





least 80% of the concepts, then I need to find another way to teach the subject and go back and reteach. I constantly observe my student's participation, look, and read their work and use rubrics to assess their progress. My teaching involves providing the information, the setting, and the opportunity for the students. I then step back and watch them explore, interact, discover, discuss, and learn from each other. I think of myself as a conductor of information. My best day teaching is watching my students read a novel or do a math problem and discuss what they learned with each other while citing text evidence or a strategy in their answer.

# Now ...

Monday March 17th, 2020 was not a typical day at St. Coletta Day School. A pandemic closed all schools in the state, and I did not know how we could continue to educate our students. I knew we needed to educate our students and I knew we would find a way. So, we explored the internet, discovered, and discussed some plans and ideas that could work and made our plan. We developed a plan that involved a similar schedule to school and enormous packets of work that we compiled together and sent



home to our students. We gave them everything we would have in school plus their iPad and online curriculum too. As the weeks turned into months, we added daily phone calls and one on one lessons taught over google duo. We uploaded hundreds of videos of us teaching classes, reading books, daily challenges, Spanish words of the day, music classes, science videos from UEC, art classes and anything we could find that could help our students. The students took pictures of their work every day and emailed it to the teachers. As one of those teachers, I received over 1,575 emails from my students in three months and processed +5,250 assignments through google drive. We were still learning, and the students were still producing a ton of data to drive our teaching. The parents, students and teachers were all working hard to make school happen. However, we were all frustrated and exhausted. This plan was missing something.

The something that was missing was RELATIONSHIPS. We needed to get back to relationships. We needed to find a way to connect. So, we added weekly check-ins on Zoom with any of the students who wanted to join. We had scavenger hunts, sang happy birthday, and found ways to connect. We learn in "Teacher School" that we must build relationships with our students before we can teach them. Students cannot learn if you do not feel safe, loved, and that they belong. These thoughts led us as a staff to examine how we could take our lessons and instruct them in such a way that we still emphasized connections with our students. We looked at our spring schedule and noticed that it was mostly asynchronous, meaning the students did the work on their own at their own pace with daily lessons and check-ins with the teachers only. One on one instruction is a good thing however the students were missing out on the learning they received from each other during our typical school



day. So, going forward in the new world that we live in we made a new plan that is a mixture of small group synchronous (same time) instruction with their classmates and asynchronous lessons that students do independently. This interaction between teachers and students and between students and students is vital for relationships. Of course, remote, or virtual instruction makes developing relationships harder. Again, if we provide the setting, the information, and the opportunity for this to happen. I believe that my students and their parents will continue to embrace these opportunities and be our partners in this new adventure. I look forward to watching my students learn from each other as they discover new knowledge and discuss their text evidence or strategy, only this time I will be watching on computer on Google Meet or Zoom.


