A JOURNEY OF DISCOVERY

are the services we provide. Then we had to put that information into a format that someone not familiar with the school would be able to look at objectively and know exactly who we are and what we do.

With the help of the staff, the parents and the board of directors, we accomplished our goal.

Our mission was always the focus of our goal. "To provide an academic and social/ functional curriculum to meet the needs of students with special needs that will prepare them to realize their full learning potential and become productive and contributing citizens."

Our vision became clearer, our purpose was validated and our future shined a bit brighter. We accomplished something that only a few schools choose to do voluntarily. The task was a large one. It was sometimes overwhelming and there were times when we thought we might not achieve our goal. But, we endured.

So what does being a fully accredited school really mean? What's the benefit? Why did we begin this journey in the first place? Good guestions. Part of the answer has to do with integrity. We know that there is much

> more to school than academic learning. We teach our students not only about the value of a great education but also, about the values contained in that education. We respect each other. We learn to become responsible individuals and

to value the uniqueness of every person.

Accreditation also means that we are validated as a school. This opens up opportunities for us to approach foundations for funding. Individuals and organizations like to attach their support to schools like ours that show they are accountable for what we say we are going to do.

Jamie Schroeter (aka Ms. Jamie), Classroom Aide


I am a graduate of UW-Madison's Art History Department


